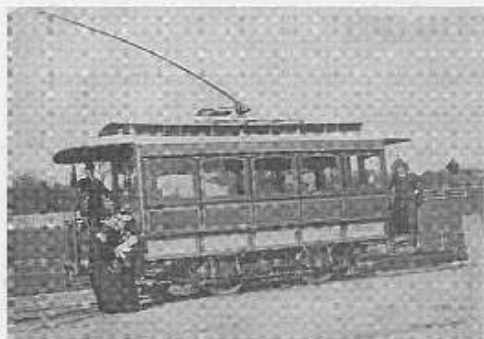

April 1903.

The first electric trams in Australia carried real estate speculators from Box Hill station to Doncaster for ten years during the land boom of the 1880's and early 90's. Despite this, Bendigo selected battery powered trams because the overhead wiring was considered unsightly. They proved to be underpowered for the hilly terrain, frequently breaking down and having to be towed by horses to the recharging station on Mollison Street. After thirteen weeks, the service was discontinued. The trams were later converted to steam and remained in service for four years but the company could not make a profit, and was sold in 1899.

The official opening of Bendigo's electric tram service took place on the 21st April 1903, although they had already been running for a few days between Bendigo and Eaglehawk. Public transport had arrived! Trams ran at 10 minute intervals in the morning and early evening, and at 15 minute intervals for the rest of the 18 hour day. Timetables were arranged to coincide with church services, and "specials" were added for sporting events. Trams ran seven days a week for the next 69 years.
