The Guest Speaker at the August Meeting is our own Member, John Neil, who will speak on the subject "The changing scene in Eastern Europe, based on two visits to the Czech Republic, one before and one after the "Velvet Revolution"."

At our July meeting we heard a very interesting talk by Dr David Brown, who is the Director of the Loddon Campaspe College of TAFE.

After being introduced by Alan Dingle, Dr Brown commenced his performance by posing three conundrums.

What do you call a paddock full of Irishmen? - A paddy field.

What do you call a paddock full of Australians? - A vacant lot.

Why do you allow an Aussie only 20 mins. for lunch? - If you give him longer he needs retraining.

This provided an opening for the subject of training. David began with a brief historical introduction with some really historical pictures of the college and some of the personalities associated with its early days. Following this up, David showed us pictures of the newer buildings, most of which were inaugurated during his term of office. To complete that picture, we had some future plans shown. One of the most interesting threads in the description was the changing roles of the Octagonal Building. It has been a library twice. It has been a laboratory, a classroom. It has been partitioned into all shapes of rooms. The gallery has been concealed by a false ceiling. It's future represents yet another use, as a restaurant for the Hospitality Organisation.

The TAFE College is now a widely scattered business, spread over North Central Victoria. One unexpected aspect is that it has the responsibility of conducting Educational Programmes in three prisons in its area.

The student enrolment in 1992 was 7973 students of which 57% were male. The total budget was \$1 million in 1976 and is \$14 million.

Plans are in hand for new courses in many areas of study and will consist of Certificate, Advanced Certificate and Associate Diploma Courses.

In the end, Ken Coles made appropriate remarks and thanked Dr Brown, making the usual presentation.

The Deniliquin Tour Report

42 Members and Friends took a 2 day tour to Deniliquin N.S.W. mid July. We visited 3 Pokie Clubs each with meals and where a gained calories and a few also gained jackpots.

We also had a guided tour around the town of Deniliquin and its environs including the Rice Mill, Rotary Club Projects; we wriggled out from a Worm Farm, and we were introduced to close to ground crop flying techniques at the Deniliquin aerodrome.

At the Rice Mill we learnt that 90% of our Australian rice production is exported - even sending increasing quantities to China and Japan.

The Rotary Projects included the re-building of a Railway Platform and Rail Line extension for tourist development near the township; a Multi-Sporting Complex of over 30 acres (a 15 year project) and the landscaping of 2 other land sites for beautification and general public use. All this Rotary Club challenge being intiated and gradually being planned and built by a Club of just 33 members - to date a successful story just 2 years into the programme. The touring group were so impressed with the local Deniliquin, Rotary, they donated \$56 from a quick spontaneous whip-around.

Overall the tour group totally enjoyed our full 2 days and we are looking to another short trip to where-ever.

These short trips are becoming quite a popular feature of our Bendigo Probus tours programme.
