A Special General meeting is held every 3rd Wednesday of each month at 10.00 am. at the Masonic Centre, McIvor Road, Bendigo.

At our meeting of August 15th the guest speakers are Muriel and Ian Thornton who will be showing slides and speaking of their recent second trip to China. Ladies are invited to attend.

GUEST SPEAKER:

Geoff Biles introduced the speaker at our July meeting giving us a short biography. The speaker was Paul Davies, musical instrument maker of Castlemaine.

Paul grew up in Glen Waverley and, working part-time in a local music shop, gradually began, under expert guidance, to repair musical instruments. As a guitar and violin player he had special interest in these and other stringed instruments, and he started making these. To



further his skills he went overseas, to Europe, eventually returning to Australia where he set up a shop in Castlemaine.

Violin making is conducted in a very traditional way, the tools and techniques now are little changed from what they were 200 years ago. One modern innovation which Paul has pioneered is the use of computer controlled machines, but only for the preliminary stages, the final work must still be done by hand. Paul's working philosophy is 'Respect for the past and vision for the future'.

There are 72 separate pieces of timber in a violin. Maple and spruce are the traditional materials. The softer spruce is used for the top of the model, the back and body are the harder maple. However Paul is experimenting with native Australian timbers. The tone of the finished instrument depends on the design, the construction, the materials and the varnish. The timber must be seasoned for at least 10 years. To glue the component parts together natural glue is used made from hide or bone. The composition of the varnish is somewhat secret; Paul's brother, a research chemist at Cambridge has done analysis of the varnish. One interesting point is that in the old Italian violins, before the varnish was applied, volcanic ash was applied to the surface and this cements wood and varnish together.

The proportions of the body use the Golden Proportion which was discovered by the ancient Greeks and has been used by artists ever since. (Note: inquire about the Golden Proportion from Ken Coles). The scroll at the end of the neck uses Fibonacci numbers (again, see Ken) and is made of maple.

Paul ended his talk by illustrating the tone of some instruments by playing a tune or two.

After answering many questions, which demonstated the interest which the talk evoked, Paul was presented with a Probus beaker by Ron Twitt.
