Today's Guest Speaker is Prof. Les Kilmartin, Pro-Vice Chancellor of Latrobe University and Dean, who will speak on The View from the Hill, retrospective and prospective

The Speaker at the July meeting was introduced by Barry O'Brien and was Chris De Araugo. He talked about Lead On – Youth of Australia. This organisation was founded by Rob Hunt, the dynamic CEO of Bendigo Bank. The aim is to attempt to halt the drain of Youth from the country districts to the capital cities.

Young people need to be involved in the local activities, social, cultural, commercial, whatever. This can involve training in Public Speaking and Public Relations, perhaps with training

in Information Technology.

Projects are planned and arranged with an array of organisations, banks, shops cinemas, and offices. Among such schemes was one with Mal McGovern who had a group of youngsters working in the furniture store. Another was when 3 young people had participation with the Loddon Valley Housing Project, they all did well, being involved with computers under the eyes of Ken Marchingo.

Many of the youngsters are eventually taken on permanently to work with the organisation. Financial support has been provided by businesses, notably Bendigo Bank. The State Government supplied some funds at the start of the scheme, when the liberals under Kennett were in power, but

this was cut off by the ALP later.

The Bendigo Bombers and Essendon are becoming involved. The Bendigo Advertiser has made available space in Tuesdays Advertiser for a youth section called "Loop", which has been successfull for both sides.

New branches have been formed in Queensland, at Ipswich and Beaudesert among others, and

Tasmania may well be involved in the future.

The appreciation of the meeting was expressed by Maurice Pease, who also made the presentation.

THE WONDERS OF QUEENSLAND. 20/7/03 to 3/8/03

SUNDAY, JULY 20. 2003

Our party of A consisting of Bendigo Probus members, sister clubs Strathfieldsaye, Sandhurst, Rochester, Bendigo Ladies, and friends of

Probus left a cold Bendigo bound for Queensland.

Our coach arrived at Tullarmarine in plenty of time for our flight to Coolangatta. Conditions were perfect for flying with little turbulence and we touched down on the scheduled time. The coach from our hosts at the Sungold Harbourside Resort was there waiting for us with our friendly and capable driver Norm in charge. The trip from Coolangatta to our home for the next fortnight was full of interest made possible by the commentary provided by Mr. Unbelieveable, Norm. In the short 20 miles from the Airport to Sungold it was most noticeable particularly to those who had been there 4 years ago of the immense changes made by the additions of new buildings, houses, roads and the landscape developments generally - this we were to observe wherever we travelled in the fortnight ahead. After settling into our new "home" we were taken to our first dinner outing on the Gold Coast - Frenchy's Restaurant.

MONDAY, JULY 21.

We began our journey into the wonders of Queensland with an orientation address from our hostess & Sungold Manager, Lyn. We were all presented with a printed daily programme outlying our proposed visiting places for the first week. Today was "settling in" day but we were able to enjoy an afternoon sunset canal cruise in and around Sanctuary Cove. As we sailed along we were able to view the many waterside mansions of the "rich and famous" who lived in the area and to see the huge collection of boats & yachts anchored there. At 5.50 we departed for dinner at Sisters Restaurant - this was just one of the many highly rated eating places which we visited at the end of each day. It was interesting to observe that the coach bumped increasingly more each time it crossed over the gutter after dinner each day - was it our newly acquired over-eating habit causing this?

TUESDAY, JULY 22.

Today's visit included a rest to the "Forest of Dreams", embracing the famous Springbrook mountain range with an abundance of interest inc. the purlingbrook Falls, several lookouts with beautiful views of the forests, banana plantations, 4 waterfalls, the Natural Arch where raging waterfalls tumble, indeed a contrast to the urbanised lowlands. Our dinner venue after we returned to base was the Captain's Table.

WEDNESDAY, July 23.

A change from mountain scenery to city environment resulted in a visit to Jupiters Casino where we were to enjoy the live stage spectacular "Storm". This is regarded as one of the most spectacular live shows ever brought to the stage, visually stunning with vibrant costuming and amazing special effects never before seen in Australia. The show kept us all enthralled for 2 hours. The Monorail, Pokies and eating places occupied an hour or two of our time before we returned to our resort for a short rest, then to go for our dinner at Gilhoolies Restaurant.

THURSDAY, July 24.

We headed for Brisbane today on the new 4-lane highway which we had seen being constructed during our previous visit 4 years ago. The transformation has been appreciated by all who travel on it whether it be for business or private reasons and also for the immense saving Our morning tea break at the Roma St. Parkland was an eyeopener. The parkland was built on the site of a disused section of the railway system and almost in the heart of Brisbane. The spectacular garden is a horticultural and botanic showpiece and open for daily inspection from dawn to dusk. A small train was a feature of the project and was well patronised by our party who preferred the ride moreso than the walk - the journey around the park was 1.3 km. Congratulations to the Brisbane Govt. for this great attraction - total cost 74 million dollars, 2 years to build and currently employing 8 gardeners plus guides and office staff. The jelly beans presented to our party at the conclusion of the train ride were much appreciated! We continued our journey passing many points of interest in & around Brisbane before arriving at Redcliffe where we had lunch whilst enjoying a mannequin parade of a group of girls and I male attired in colourful fashions of the 50's. The walls & ceilings of the building were clad with everyday items depicting the era - Elvis Presley display, baby dolls of all shapes and sizes, and outside the building 2 huge cupie dolls were mounted above the entrance. Back to the resort and again listening to an interesting commentary from Norm as we motored along - an interesting day ended at the Rabina Tavern where we had another enjoyable dinner.

FRIDAY, July 25.

Our tour today was classified as a "salt, sand and schooners" day. After leaving the resort around 9.30 a.m. we passed through many seaside resorts including Burleigh Heads, well renowned for its surfing beaches, natural parks, a wildlife park, beachfront markets, great food and luxury accommodation with spectacular ocean and hinterland views. We continued our travels leaving the beaches behind and once again ascending the mountains to Currumbin where we had our morning tea break at a large rock pool alongside the main road, the site being equipped with tables, seating and all facilities necessary for our "picnic". A walk amongst the many interesting shops was enjoyed by all before we boarded the coach again and travelled back towards Burleigh where we had our regular lunch break. The casual drive back to our resort passed through many places of interest before we arrive) "home" again a little before "p.m. The day concluded with another excellent dinner, the venue being at the Saigon Palace restaurant.

SATURDAY, July 26.

Our trip today was to the Tweed Valley with its many associated famous beaches then to ascend to the fascinating mountain ranges and home of five amazing world heritage National Parks. In the centre of the Tweed lies Mt. Warning with a height of 1156 mrs. and noted for being the largest extinct volcano in the Southern Hemisphere. On special vantage points there are 360 deg. views over the Tweed Vallary and many of the high points are accessible to the bush walker. The Tweed includes the best of all worlds with its cultural activities, exciting nightlife, excellent beaches, national parks, rainforests and mountain ranges, etc. Our break for lunch was at the Ilnan winery nestled high in the mountains and in dense forest country. We were blessed with a beautiful sunny day and little wind which made conditions perfect for yet another Bicnic An interesting talk on wine production was given by the owner manager of the winery and we were given a sample of the various wines on display with some of the party making purchases for later consumption. The day concluded with another excellent dinner this time at Sisters restaurant - can we ever forget thos delicious shanks!

SUNDAY, July 27.

A free day, what a great idea Lyn! Our party proke up and went their several ways, some visiting friends & relatives, others to a variety of entertainment resorts, some shopping at Pacific or Australia Fairs, others just relaxing and appreciating that the Sabbath is a day of rest, however we were almost a complete party for our dinner at Mano's Restaurant. Unfortunately Gordon Glover had the misfortune to fall in the bathroom at the resort and as we found out later he had sustained a broken rib, damaged back and severe bruising. At various times as we travelled around Gordon was able to rejoin the party. He expressed his appreciation forthe wonderful help which he had received from Lin and the staff at the resort, also to the Doctor & Hospital and for the deep concern expressed by all members of our party.

MONDAY, July 28.

Driver Norm told us as we left the resort that we were in for a big day concluding with those 2 familiar words "trust me". Our mission was to go South to Byron Bay, Brunswick Heads and Bohemia and that we could have a "Tet loose" walk through the shops of Byron Bay with its many interesting shops and local residents with diverse habits. We were then driven to the top of the hill to the famous Byron Bay lighthouse where we spent some time wandering around its many vantage points searching for some of the most "Easterly" whales in Australia - questionably I or 2 were sighted but it was quite evident that they were not going to put themselves out for we Southern visitors. Our next stopping place was at the Grystal Castle at Mullumbimby situated high in the hills and a place of amazing power and beauty. Syrrounded by beautiful gardens it is home to a spectacular natural crystal display of exquisite locally designed jewellery, and a selection of unique gifts. This was indeed a highlight of the tour. Our next stop which is about 20 km. north of Byron was the coastal fishing village of Brunswick Heads where we had out lunch on the beach. Along the Brun: wick River there were villages and farming districts established which created an atmosphere of perfect escape for families who seek peace from the modern world outside. Another enjoyable day which came to a close as we dined for dinner at the Banora Club.

TUESDAY, July 29.

Today we left the resort for a "Boating the Islands" day tour. We first travelled along the Gold Coast Highway to RedIands Bay where we boarded a ferry for a pleasant voyage across the huge expanse of water taking in the Russell, Lamb & Macleay islands. From the ferry we were able to see the many housing developments and shopping areas which had been developed very recently - this was evident wherever we travelled and with an ever increasing population the demand for housing is a major concern with the prices of land and houses spiralling very repidly. After leaving the ferry we passed through Victoria Point then had our morning tea break at Cleveland in a beautiful area for picnickers - we could have done without the freezing wind though! However we welcomed the warm comfort of the coach as we journeyed onwards to the Mt. Cotton Rainforest Garden for an enjoyable cuppa and large homemade biscuits provided by our hostess, Mrs. Betty Goleby who gave us an interesting talk on the history of the precinct after which we had a guided tour of the many varied plants & trees growing on the property. We then travelled back to our base for a rest and freshen up before going to our dinner venue at the Captains Table. Again a lovely meal and the occasion highlighted by a birthday celebration for Joan Gloster - her 21st. ?? Congratulations Joan.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 30.

Another supposedly free day but our tireless party decided on several venues, some to Sea World, others to Dream World, Movie World, etc. but together again for dinner, this time to the Robina Tavern and the usual high standard meal.

THURSDAY, July 31.

A big day ahead starting with our visit to O'Reillys (The Green Mountain) and Tamborine Hinterland. Full marks to Norm for his driving expertise in driving the coach to the top of Queensland's highest mountain and without the slightest of fear from any of the party. Highlights at the top of the mount were the feeding of the flocks of wild rainbow coloured parrots, our walk over the rocking suspension bridge, and our visit to the store for the purchase of "something" to take home & souvenirs. Our return to the resort was full of interest as we travelled through Canungra, the Coomera valley and vineyards, Mt. Tamborine, and Canungra creek. A visit to the Nut Shed featuring Macadamias grown in the district was most interesting and many purchases were made by our mut lovers. FRIDAY, August 1.

A free morning was welcomed by our now "overfed" and "overtravelled" party and recommenced at 3 o'clock when we visited the Marina Mirage, a haven for lots of boats of all shapes & sizes with prices ranging from around \$1,000 into the millions. The mooring fee for boats was around \$300 a week and very strict conditions were applied to all the boat owners. We had the pleasure of a cruise around the water front on the MV Jindalee cruiser and were made familiar with the various types of craft. We were even shown a boat where many wedding ceremonies are celebrated on the water with the minister, bride & groom and guests all in attendance. A short drive the Mirana Mirage around the shopping areas was again very interesting and prepared us for dinner venue for the day at Saigen Palace.

SATURDAY, August 2.

Our day tour commenced at 9.30 a.m. with a visit to the Carrera Market. This market is renowned for its wide range of items for sale and displayed in hundreds of shops in arcade fashiom. Some of the party made purchases of small items to take home but to include anything bulky with our luggage on the flight home presented a problem. After a 2 hour browse around the shops we boarded the coach for a drive along the beach front to Point Danger for our lunch break.
