A Special General Meeting is held every 3rd Wednesday of each month at 10.00 am. at the Masonic Centre, McIvor Road, Bendigo.

The guest speaker for today's meeting is Mr. George Flack, the Bendigo representative of the Retireinvest Group. He will speak on current issues affecting pensioners.



Dr. John Ferguson of the Bendigo Health Care Group was the speaker at our last meeting in November. He was introduced by Bruce Perrin and spoke on Radio Therapy Services.

Dr. Ferguson graduated from the University of Queensland in 1978 and, after varying periods in hospitals and private practice, came to Bendigo in 1996 as Director of Medical Services. He is now Executive Director of Acute Health. John disclosed that there is a proven need for additional radio therapy units in Australia but the problems associated with increasing these services have their

roots in Canberra. The Federal Government has conducted 23 revues into radio therapy services over the last 10 years giving credence to the old adage - when in doubt have another revue. Over the last year and a half the then Health Minister for Victoria, Senator Knowles, convinced Canberra that there was a need for rural based therapy units. Although they are very expensive to build, approximately \$6 million, and have high operating costs, the Government eventually agreed to 3 trial sites for Australia. These are all in Victoria and are to be located in Bendigo, Ballarat and Latrobe Regional Hospital.

It is expected that the Bendigo facility will be operating in 2 years time.

Some of the statistics relating to Bendigo Hospital are rather interesting. It operates the largest emergency department in rural Victoria, the second largest acute hospital in rural Victoria and they have 45 visiting consultants to the hospital and Health Care Group. There is not much that cannot be done in Bendigo if you so choose. Last year 20,382 in-patients were treated on the hospital campus

and half a million occasions of service across the Group. There are now 6 general surgeons, 3 E.N.T. surgeons, 2 urologists and others at the hospital.

The treatment of cancer entails 3 strings to the bow, the surgical side, chemo therapy and radio therapy. Of these, radio therapy is the only treatment not currently available in Bendigo. This means that cancer sufferers must undertake this treatment in Melbourne.

There are 600+ new cases of cancer in the Bendigo region each year. Each machine can treat 450 cases a year indicating the necessity for a second machine. The initial project will provide one machine but building space for two. It is anticipated that a second machine will be installed in another 2 years time. This should deal with the requirements of this region which extends from Gisborne in the south to Deniliquin in the north, from Ouyen in the west to Shepparton in the east.

The buildings for these machines are called bunkers and will be built on the corner of Stewart and Bayne streets. They will have 3 foot thick concrete walls and no windows so that the radio activity generated cannot escape, but can be directed to where it is most needed. The staff required for each linear accelerator would be 5 to 7 radio therapists, a radiation oncologist and a nuclear physicist. Funding sources are as yet not determined, but will come from Federal and State grants and local resources.

Of particular interest to those present was the subject of prostate cancer. John revealed that there are three ways of determining whether this cancer is present, none of which, in isolation, can be relied upon to prove, or disprove, its existence.

After some interesting questions John was thanked by Kevin Houlahan who made the usual presentation.

Some of you may remember Monty Blandford who broadcast his "Philosopher's Scrapbook" to the listeners of radio station 3DB, Melbourne during the 40s and 50s. An understanding heart.
