Australia's Marvelous Music p Tradition.

Herb Hesse introduced Peter Ellis, and his associate, Des Skinner. Peter has been interested in music, particularly performance, since the age of 10. He is versatile, playing eight different instruments including the mouth organ, piano, concertina, accordion, piano accordion and Swanee Whistle. All of these were played by Peter in his talk, accompanied by Des Skinner on guitar.

Besides playing the instruments, Peter talked about the invention and action of most of the instruments. The mouth organ for instance was invented in Germany in the 1820's as an aid in piano tuning. It has two rows of reeds, which enable to give a tremolo effect. From the mouth organ the accordion was developed.

The concertina comes in two forms. The first was the English concertina, which was invented by Charles Wheatstone (the physicist who invented the Wheatstone Bridge). The other form of Concertina came from Germany.

Each of these instruments was demonstrated by Peter, accompanied by Des, playing Waltzes, Jigs, Country-Dance Tunes and Ballads.

Peter has a deep interest in Bush Dances, and has played with the Wedderburn Old Timers and the Emu Creek Band, and has written and published books on the topic. The whole performance was stimulating, informative, entertaining and skillful.

Afterwards Alan Dingle moved a vote of thanks and made the appropriate presentations.

PROBUS CLUB OF BENDIGO: TRIP TO MELBOURNE WEDNESDAY 4TH DECEMBR 2002

On Wednesday 4th of December, 43 Probus Club of Bendigo Members & Partners, together with some members from other Probus Clubs and friends of Probus travelled to Melbourne to visit the Ford Motor Company Factory at Campbellfield and the Caterpillar Facilities at Tullamarine. Our coach captain was Neville.

On arrival at the Ford Factory, we enjoyed a short morning tea break in the Ford Dining Room before the first half of our group departed on a 'People Transporter' for their tour of the factory. Upon their return, the second half of our group was then taken on their tour. The transporter with a Driver and Guide, Les, gave each group in turn, a most comprehensive tour of the factory, explaining each process, during which we witnessed the production of a Ford Motor Car from the beginning to the finished vehicle ready to drive out of the factory door.

Computerised control was very evident throughout the whole Factory. They controlled the 'army of robots' who in turn performed the manufacturing process of handling, welding, assembly and painting of car components, (paint is acrylic water based). Likewise, computers controlled the movement of the car through each spot on the production line, whether it be underfloor, overhead or on conveyers and finally the car was tested 'under power' on rollers, which take approximately 2 minutes for each car. Ford employs 3300 employees, works 2 x 8 hour shifts, 4 to 4.5 hours stock must always be on hand in the factory.

Plant 1 in Broadmeadows, per day: Builds 440 Cars & uses \$1500 electricity, Water \$1800 and gas \$8500.

Our travelers had their lunch in the Dining Room prior to departure for the Caterpillar Factory at 12:45pm. We acknowledge and greatly appreciate assistance of Jamal Kakour (Ford Alive) with arrangements for our tour.

Following our arrival at Caterpillar we were directed to their Melbourne Distribution Center. A huge building, just a portion of the whole factory area. Our group was divided into three sections for conducted tours of the facility. The M.D.C. is an 8-year-old building, with floor space 40,000 square metres & yard space of 15,000 square metres, and employs 65 storeman. Stock items are bar coded, radio frequency. All operations are computer controlled for both incoming and outgoing stock and for movement, allocation and placement of stock within the facility. Stock is stored in selected sections of the storage racks which extend to 25ft high, and all are readily accessible to fork lifts. Stock items vary from I oz to 1 tonne. The facility operates 7 days, 24 hours per day. Orders are delivered 98% of the time within 24 hours, 100 tonnes of parts are moved in and out on a daily basis. They scrap many of the slow moving parts each month. Dispatch Cartons are all numbered and coded for size identification. The M.D.C. is proud of its distinction in being the most productive caterpillar distributor in the world, it can locate any stock item within a minute. 'Backing each and every caterpillar machine is a vast product network and part of M.D.C.'s Mission statement is "to keep 'em running" anywhere, anytime and operating at the lowest possible cost'.

After M.D.C. we were taken to the plant, which manufactures Road Graders of 125, 140 and 165 H.P. for which the Power Packs and control systems are imported from Caterpillar in America. The remainder of the components for the Graders are manufactured at the plant and the Graders assembled on sight. For painting, the Grader is

placed in a large spray booth, as the paint has magnetic particles, which adhere to metal only. No masking of non-metallic parts is required. The Factory produces one Motor Road Grader per Day. It also manufactures large excavator buckets and mining truck bodies. We were also given a brief tour of the Caterpillar learning Center at which first class training is provided for their apprentices and other employees within the facility.

We wish to acknowledge the assistance of Kathy Szadovszky with arrangements for the tour of the facility and also to our guides, David, Adrian Gauci, Tony Arena, Wal Scales and the young lady who so excellently detailed the various sections of the facility and its many and varied operations. Our thanks to all.

At the conclusion of a most enlightening and enjoyable day, we departed Caterpillar at 4:15pm, right on time. However, at Gisborne our coach developed a 'fuel' fault which caused problems for Neville who capably nursed the vehicle home to Bendigo, arriving at 6:40pm.
