The Guest Speaker at todays meeting is Hugh Mason, the Engineer Designer of Roxby Downs township.

At our last meeting in November 1996 Doris Le Toille, from Financial Information Services of the Veterans Affair Department outlined the various categories namely:-

Other major issues that need consultation were:-

- (4) Gifting and or lending to family members
- (5) Loan scheme as a charge on estate

She pointed out that her Department's approach when giving advice is wholistic, and includes the retiree's health and expected lifestyle. In general terms it was apparent her information Service is there to make sure that full entitlements to benefits is forthcoming. Thomas Henry Iser was born in Bendigo on the 20th April, 1919 the second son of William and Winifred Iser; and the grandson of Henry Iser who had emigrated from Hamburg Germany in the 1880's and settled in Bendigo. He joined his brother-in-law William Humme in the timber business which was eventually named Hume & Iser.

Tom started his education at Gravel Hill primary school, before attending Scotch College and then night school at Cox's Business College in View Street, Bendigo. Here he gained Associationship with the Federal Institute of Accountants. Leaving school he started work at Hume & Iser and remained there until his retirement in 1981. In 1982 he moved to Ocean Grove staying there till early this year when he returned to Bendigo.

In 1940 he married Mary McNaught at St.Andrews Bendigo and they have three sons and two daughters - Tim Iser and Caroline Hope are living in Bendigo - the others live in Melbourne, Sydney and Foster.

His war service commenced with the 17th Light Horse (M.G.) Regiment moving to the 14th Armoured Regiment and eventually serving overseas with the 24th Australian Infantry Battalion on Bougainville.

His sporting activities in Bendigo were with the Bendigo Swimming Club, the Bendigo Rowing Club and the Bendigo Golf Club. Community efforts are with the R.S.L. and Legacy.

REPORT ON VISIT TO "MT.LONARCH FINE CHINA" & "OASIS LEAD CRYSTAL".

On Thursday 28th November a bus load of Probians and friends set off in John Rainbow's very plush bus; a marked difference over our standard set of wheels. The whole trip was a leisurely drive in the vicinity of Avoca and the Amphitheatre area.

Our first port of call was at the "Mt.Lonarch Fine China" studio; our hosts were Lorraine & Peter Lucey together with John Kennett. The Bone China made on the property is considered amongst the finest of all fired clay products...translucent, and delicate in appearance, and is the hardest of all vitreous fired clays. Much of the hand painted decorative work is accomplished by Lorraine; a recipient of a Churchill Fellowship, studying at Worcester to become the foremost decorator of Bone China in Australia. Peter (who also studied at Worcester) gave us a demonstration/ explanation of the manufacturing process, then lunch on the premises.

Brenda & Geoffrey Dickinson were our next hosts at "The Oasis Crystal Studio/Gallery". Here we saw a demonstration on the making of hand-made lead crystal products and glass blowing. Also in the gallery we saw examples of lead crystal items, such as,

plates, bowls, vases, paperweights and individual pieces made to order. Afternoon-tea (to my mind, even a lesser health standard than our lunch) was taken on the premises, and then off we went to return to Bendigo via the ice-cream shop at Avoca.

On the whole a quiet, relaxing and enjoyable day; both venues were well worth the visit. Thanks to John Rainbow (Driver) and Arthur Eaton (Trips Organiser).
