The guest speaker at today's meeting is Mr. Darren Lewis, Chief Executive Officer, North Central Goldfields Regional Library Corporation

For our November meeting the guest speaker was Mr. Ian Reid from the Bendigo Regional Institute Of TAFE who spoke on what Small Business is in Australia, what it contributes and how it can be helped in its impact on the Bendigo community. He was introduced by Robert Holmes.

Today it is recognised that the Small Business Sector is a significant part of the Australian economy and Australia is looking to this sector to lead it into the year 2000 and beyond in terms of economy, development and employment.

There are currently 887,000 Small Business Enterprises in Australia, employing 50% of the private sector work force and accounting for 70% of the new jobs in this country. It has now been realised by both State and Federal governments of the importance of the Small Business Sector to the economy.

On the subject of Information Technology, Ian was very critical of the lack of standards in the computer industry and of the customer service in some stores. However, he is very aware of the value of the tools now available to us.

Ian also spoke of Government attempts to fund consultants who would prepare Business Plans for small business. In some instances this did not work and Ian decided that the best way to prepare a plan was for the individual to do the work himself, under guidance. This has been quite successful and has been recognised in the Mortimor Report on Small Business. A core part of the work of the Professional Training Services is the New Enterprise Incentive Scheme, a Federal Government initiative, which takes people on Social Security benefits who have a business idea, the potential and the basic resources to start the business. The idea of the NEIS program is to take those people, give them training and support for 12 months in developing that business.

The work of the PTS can be divided into 3 areas:

1. Training for small business
2. Consulting on a fee for service basis
3. Counselling

After a short question time Ian was thanked by Kevin Houlahan for a very interesting and informative talk.

BENDIGO PROBUS TRIP TO RAAF MUSEUM AND TO VICTORIA'S OPEN RANGE ZOO.

With an anticipated day temperature of 24°C it meant perfect weather conditions for touring and at this time of the year the countryside is so lush and green that the vista keeps rolling along.

To set the scene for the first destination of the RAAF Museum at Point Cook - the acknowledged birthplace of Australia's Military Aviation - our ex RAAF types - Bob Hollow (Spitfires), Ernie Waterworth (Bombers) and Cliff Nievandt (Groundstaff) turned back their memory clocks 50 years and kept the audience rapt with their service recollections.

Friends of the RAAF Museum provide guides for the quite extensive exhibition. Our guide was John Biggs. John's knowledge came from his progression from groundcrew apprentice to pilot.

The quality of the exhibits was top class and the fact that they were displayed where they were originally in service added to their authenticity. We were all fascinated with the workshop hangar to see the progress in restoration of the historic Supermarine Walrus which had pranged on Heard Island in the 1940's.

What a beautiful aircraft is the Hawker Demon and what a rugged warhorse is the Boomerang. The Maurice Farman Shorthorn looked like something from the film "Those Magnificent Men in Their Flying Machines" - a film that I have never grown tired from seeing.

The museum stimulates the imagination and I half expected to see Biggles or Rockfist Rogan. How they would have enjoyed the Wirraway, Winjeel, CT4 - the Plastic Parrot, Neptune, Mustang, Canberra, Iroquois, Pika (the only one), Sabre, Vampire, Gloster Meteor, Mirage, Phantom and the f111. I looked longingly at the Tiger Moth and, for a moment, I swear that Biggles was in the cockpit.

The dioramas were painstakingly put together and I found fascination with the successful Dam Buster raid on the Mohne Dam in the Ruhr Valley of the industrial heart of Germany in WW2. One visit is just not enough to absorb it all from this museum.

We then enjoyed our picnic luncheon prepared by the greatest cooks in Australiaus.

Back on the bus and in a very short time we were at Victoria's open range zoo at Werribee.

This remarkable new zoo is established on 200 hectares of grassy plains and the wide sweeping river terraces surrounding the final stages of the Werribee River before it enters the sea. The abundant supply of water is being used to develop the physical features of the site and an ambitious planting program.

The concept of open range requires a Safari guide for the bus, and we stay in the bus. Anne Venables shared her enthusiasm as we drove along the bush track to find family groups of the animals which roam freely in well-disguised enclosures, kangaroo, wallaby, zebra, emu, ostrich, giraffe, bison, deer, camels, water-buffalo, rhinos, hippos, monkeys, meerkats and numerous species of birds.

The journey itself, which I did not time, must have taken a full hour and was full of interest and projected the feeling of freedom and safety in the open spaces which further contributes to the uniqueness of this type of zoo.

The base camp is a low, unpretentious, modern complex with generous open brick terraces complete with outdoor furniture. Cafe, bistro, gift shops are of a high standard and the wide verandahs make it a great place to relax and to enjoy the view of the lake, bird life and roaming animals. Somehow, the rigours of the safari, and the sense of the hunt make man - the hunter and of course woman - the hunter want to sit back and sip tea and cold drinks and to enjoy those pleasures of eating icecream.

Back on the bus and that wonderful feeling of self-indulgence that I don't have to do the driving. So what does it matter if I settle back and catch up on a few "zeds" and a late afternoon nap.

What are they saying?

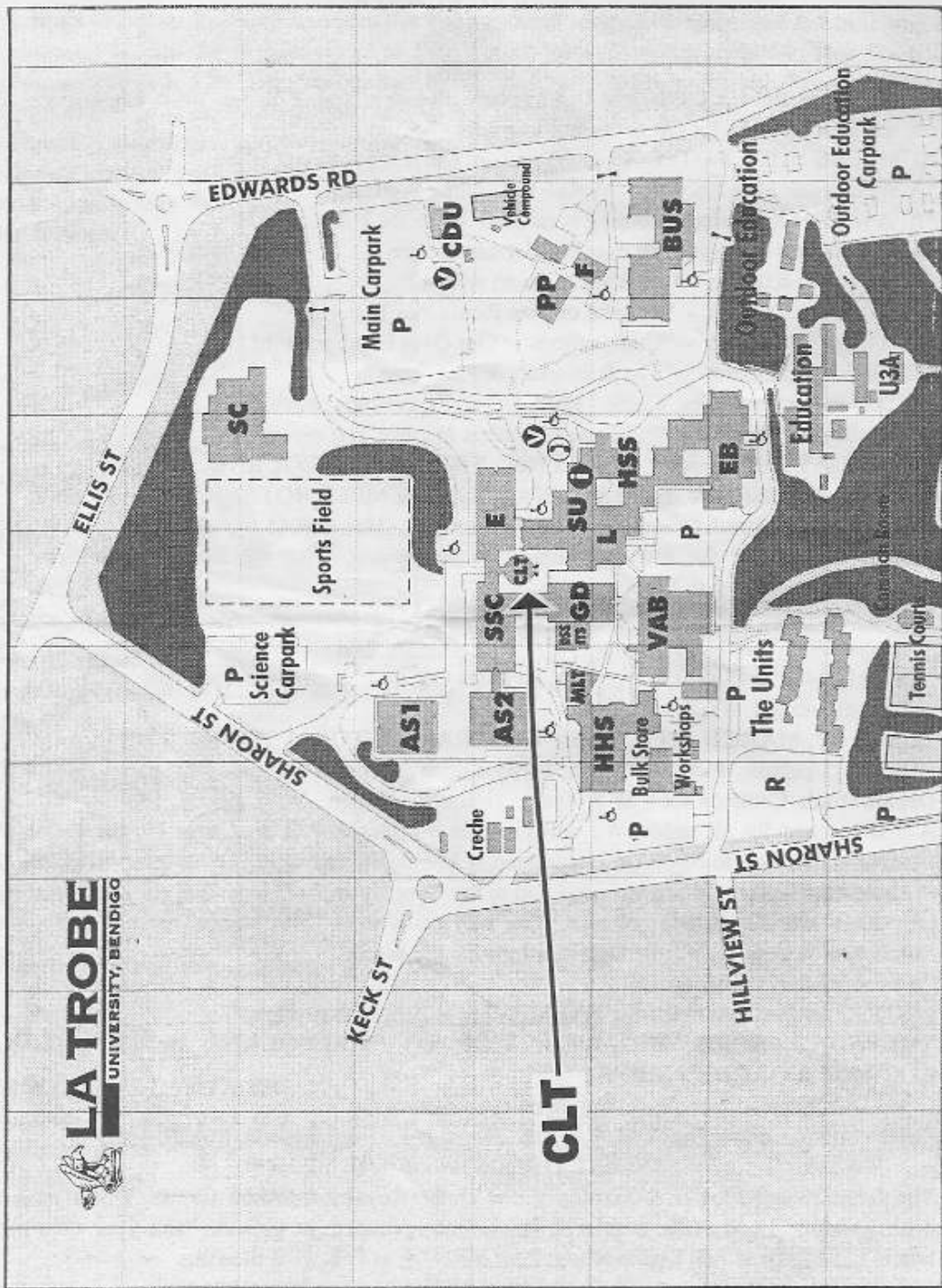
