GUEST SPEAKER at our July Meeting is MR. BILL MILLER, a well known Eaglehawk identity. His subject is "Following the Canning Stock Route".

DR. WESLEY BLACKMORE was introduced by BOB HOLMES, who told us that Wesley was heading back to China in six weeks time.

We learned a lot about modern China from Dr. Wesley Blackmore, our Guest Speaker in June, the correct pronunciation of the names of cities and of people as well as some revelations about economics, corruption, inefficiency and food.

The notion of a Communist China is erroneous, Chinese life is still (and may always be) based on tradition and custom. Mao Tse Tung had the status and adulation of an Emperor. There is no such sing as Democracy in China, nor in Asia in general, unquestioning obedience is central to the lifestyle and philosophy of living. Of the Chinese population, 85% are illiterate peasants who are concerned only with subsistence and staying alive.

In the towns and cities, and the countryside, all the people are organised in a DANWEI, a Work Unit. It provides housing, food, clothing, etc. and expecially INFLUENCE. All education is paid for by the individual and progress in this, and all other spheres, is determined by influence and bribery; to get accepted into a Work Unit is determined by influence and bribery. China is a society without money, it is replaced by barter — or skills or whatever.

For peasant boys the Army is a good channel to move from the country to the city and improve life. Accommodation is scarce,

but the Army provides.

As for population control, the authorities are powerless to enforce it among the peasants.

At the Conclusion, Dr. Blackmore was thanked by BILL COWLING, who made the usual presentations.
