## MEMBER BIOGRAPHY

Born in Warracknabeal during the depression, Ken Coles spent his early years at Reedy Dam - halfway between Beulah and Birchip. His parents' property was a typical Southern mallee farm.

Schooling was commenced at Reedy Dam but because of his fathers involvement in the Army, he also attend at Dimboola and Batchica before settling at Warracknabeal. On completion of his Matriculation, Ken was offered, and accepted a Primary Studentship with the Victorian Education Department. This involved one year as a student teacher, one year at a Teachers' College and a committment to teach for a minimum of three years. While at Teachers' College in Ballarat, he boarded next door to two young ladies - Joyce and Val MacKenzie.

On completion of his year in Ballarat, Ken's Studentship was extended for three years to enable him to complete a Bachelor of Arts of the University of Melbourne.

Ken's teaching career began in the Western District at Lang Koop (Near Edenhope) and at Horsham West. While at Horsham he married Joyce MacKenzie. They have four children and three grandchildren.

In 1959 a position for a Mathematics Education lecturer was advertised at Bendigo Teachers' College. Ken applied for, and gained this position as from the beginning of 1960. Worth noting is that in 1960 there were eight Teachers' Colleges in Victoria and only four had lecturers with qualifications in mathematics.

Apart from teaching at California Gully Primary School in 1965, Ken remained in Teacher Education until 1981 and was actively involved with the politics of the merger of the State College of Victoria Bendigo with the Bendigo Institute of Technology. This merger formed the Bendigo College of Advanced Education (1976) - now LaTrobe University Bendigo.

In 1981, the position of College Registrar became vacant. Ken successfully applied for this position and remained there until retirement in 1987.

Since 1987, activities have included Bendigo Probus Club, Bendigo Competitions Society, Strath-haven Council, Eaglehawk Billiards Club, travel and Sundry home duties.
