# Today's Guest Speaker is Steven Lindsay who is a Urologist.

Last meeting we had as Guest Speaker Cynthia Gardner, she was introduced by President Bryan. Her subject was Niagora Therapy.

This system was started in Canada then Europe. A 50 year research programme resulted in the system which can benefit sufferers from many conditions, high blood pressure, arthritis and many others.

The essential idea of the therapy is based on improving the body's two circulation systems, namely blood circulation lymphatic circulation. Good circulation supplies nutrients and oxygen to the tissues, healing, regenerating and destroying and removing toxic substances. Besides advising sufferers on achieving a healthy regime, the firm manufactures and markets health equipment. Selected exercise programs are offered to improve the circulation. ## On 3Day/2 Night Gippsland Trip Tues 3rd to Fri. 5th May, 2005 with Bendigo Coach Lines.

Day (1) Tuesday 3rd May. 2005:

Forty Six Passengers comprising Members of Probus Club of Bendigo & their Partners together

with some from other Probus Clubs & friends of Probus, departed Bendigo on time at 7.30am.

Our Coach Captain was "our friend to all" Neville Dewhurst.

\*\* Pam & John Fitzpatrick of Port Macquarie Probus Club N.S.W. joined us at Trafalgar.

Our morning tea stop was in a pleasant lush green bushland setting near Bunyip, refreshed we continued on to the township of Trafalgar, where at the Criterian Hotel we met our Tour Guide for the next three days Val (Spud) Murphy who welcomed us, and what a treasure we found her to be. Early after our arrival we were taken to dining room where we were served a Potato based delicacy for our lunch, after which Val gave a demonstration of how to make "Potato Coconut Roughs," which later, we all sampled.

Lunch over, we boarded the Coach together with Val for what was to prove a memorable three days. First we were shown over the Thorpdale area which is renowned for its Potatoes, very pleasant scenery, rolling hills and green terrain. A brief stop made at the entrance to the Murphy's Property & Packing Sheds, what a huge operation this was, they produce potatoes from January to June and at production peak between 150 to 200 Transport Trucks, each carrying 20 to 22 tons depart the property each week.

Additional to potato production, the Murphys have 80 acres set out for onions and also are involved in raising fat lambs. Next stop was at Val's home and beautiful spacious gardens where we sampled potato ice cream and met up with their Minature Fox Dog Joey, who eats potatoes. At 4.00pm we arrived at Morwell and quickly settled in at the Del Spano Motel, our home for the next two nights. Dinner was at the Morwell RSL Club where we were treated to a quality three course meal.

### Day 2 Wed 4th May:

Continental breakfast completed, we departed from the Motel at 8.50am for the Morwell Rose Gardens. Gravel paths lead through a picturesque arrangement of garden structures, enhanced with 3000 rose bushes flourishing in four acres of parkland. There are 250 varieties of roses planted in 100 beds displaying individual colours, careful selection has been made ensuring masses of colour and contrast.

The garden contains hybrid teas, miniatures, floribundas, climbers, pillars, weepers, heritage, old fashioned, David Austin, modern shrub roses, ground covers & oddities. The gardens were constructed and are maintained by Volunteers, were opened in 1992. Our thanks to Committee President Bernie and volunteer Ian who met us on arrival and gave us an extensive tour of these beautiful gardens.

At 10.00am we then set off for Walhalla travelling through beautiful mountain scenery. We visited the viewing area of the huge Thompson River Storage Dam which supplies Melbourne's water.

Lunch was at one of the early Walhalla Hotels where appetites were satisfied with Vegetable Soup and a huge Salad Sandwich. Lunch complete, we were taken in the Coach and shown

the township after which we set out on foot to explore this historic town, there was much to see. Town population of 14 persons.

At 3.30pm we boarded the Walhalla Goldfields 2'6"Railway Narrow Gauge train for our trip from Walhalla and after passing over Thompson river Bridge, alighted at Thompson Rail Station. Restoration of the buildings, trestle bridges, rail track and rolling stock was made possible by the volunteers who also operate this scenic railway journey.

Next stop was at the Erica Hotel for a happy hour where much memorabilia of early times in the bush were displayed, especially those relating to timber. Our evening meal was again at the Morwell R.S.L. where we were quickly seated and promptly served with another quality 3 Course meal.

On return to the Motel Val had arranged a Happy Last Night Function which created much amusement and laughter, the end to a perfect day.

#### Day 3. Thursday 5th May, 2005.

Breakfast over, cases loaded, at 8.50am we departed from our Morwell Motel for further touring before setting out for home. Our first visit was to the Erinea Lavender Farm at Mirboo North where Beverley gave a short talk on the setting up of the farm, its operation and the extensive uses and benefits of Lavender. Many in the group visited the gift shop which had an extensive array of Lavender products. Meanwhile Derek gave a conducted tour of the farm area and the drying sheds during which he explained the growing, harvesting and also demonstrated stripping of the lavender.

After departing the Lavender Farm, we travelled by Coach to Mirboo North where Val gave us a guided tour of the township, which had an extensive area of very attractive Murals which reflected the locality.

Our lunch was at the Commercial Hotel for a meal with mine Host Fiona. During this time Elizabeth from Mirboo Tourism gave a short talk on the town which Bendigo Bank has greatly helped. Forty Volunteers produce a weekly Newspaper, Mirboo has won a Tidy Towns award, town pride - 23 power poles with lower portion were painted and decorated. Our final visit on this trip was to Val's home and garden where those who so desired purchased bags of Subago Potatoes. Alan Dingle, on behalf of the group made a presentation to Val, acknowledging her knowledge of the area, excellent commentaries, her considerate and helpful manner and the way in which she looked after us, ensuring we had a "great trip.".

Then homeward bound, with short stops at Bunyip and Kyneton, arriving Bendigo at 6.40pm.

Hugh Ward made a presentation to Neville, who with qualities like those of Val ensured we had a most enjoyable tour. "What a great team Val & Neville made."

Summary: An excellent trip all round, with a pleasant and friendly group, a nice motel, a variety of meals of very good quality with most adequate servings, tours of great variety with our excellent and loveable Tour Guide Val and Coach Captain Neville Dewhurst who like Val, was most considerate, co-operative and helpful at all times.
