

GUEST SPEAKERS - Today we have a Double Act, Jess and Gordon Glover. Their subject will be "Wanderings in Tibet".

The speaker at our last meeting was Reg MacDonald, the retired Managing Editor of the Bendigo Advertiser. He was introduced to us by Cyril Michelson and spoke on **Experiences as a journalist**. To record all of Reg's C.V. would require more than all of the space in this issue; among other activities he has been Speech writer (Minder) to two Prime Ministers, John Gorton and William McMahon, managing editor of the Herald for Papua New Guinea, he has worked in Canberra, London, Sydney, Washington, Bendigo and goodness knows where else. He was a foreign correspondent for 18 years, and in this phase of his career was assigned to the Middle East, the Horn of Africa, India, Ulster, Biafra, where ever news was happening. Before coming to Bendigo, Reg had always been associated with metropolitan newspapers, then came Bendigo and a change in approach. In the big cities members of the press are virtually incognito but in Bendigo things are different, when the editor goes down the street for lunch he sometimes is waylaid and challenged over some statement he has made in print.

Some of the anecdotes Reg told us are perhaps better kept out of print, but some of Billy McMahon's slips of the tongue are worth repeating. In a pre-election statement he said "We will honour our promises on the problems we have made". "I ask you to study our record, and vote Labour". Responding to Ros Kelly, he said "I must thank the Honourable Gentleman for the effort she has made".

Newspapers are made by journalists who are only human, and they make the same kind of errors that McMahon did. In the late 1950's the Sydney Herald covered the Anzac Day, March. "Led by a colonel on a white horse, a battle-scared veteran The correction appeared next day "That should have read 'a bottle-scarred veteran'". At the third attempt they got it right.

The Advertiser now is printed using State of the art technology. The new press, which originated in Iceland and cost \$2,000,000, is capable of full-colour offset printing, but the grammar, spelling and so on are still only as good as the human beings can make them.

Back in the coach our instruction on the forest continued as we travelled over the "Black Spur" through Narbethong, Fernshaw and Healesville and back to Toolangi. A Circumnavigation of Black Range. The final all too short visit of the day was the Demby Timber Mill where we saw the milling of logs grown since the 1939 fires.
