The Guest Speaker at todays meeting is the Rev. Doug Turnball, Minister at Kennington Uniting Church.

At the May meeting our Guest Speaker Ron Smith, Director of the Regional Institute of TAFE, was introduced by Allan Dingle.

He gave a comprehensive overview of the TAFE operation. Prior to coming to Bendigo, he was employed in the Ministry for Fuel and Power, transferrred to TAFE at Wangaratta, then a working holiday teaching in Canada and Scotland.

In 1974 it was recognised the gap between Technical Colleges and Secondary and University training needed to be addressed. TAFE Institutions were formed to fill this need. There are now 26 TAFE Colleges in Victoria costing 2.7 billion annually, 15 in Melbourne and 11 Regional. A TAFE component now exists with RMIT, Swinburne and University Colleges.

TAFE has expanded into the International sphere by providing staff in Laos, Beijing, Thailand and India earning export dollars totalling 135 million.

Recognised programmes include Nurse Training, Building Studies, Civil Engineering, Mining, Hospitality Tourism, Metal Work, Rural Horticulture, Social and Community Service, Hairdressing and

Ceramics as a joint venture with Bendigo Pottery.

Expansion is now taking place with plans to occupy the existing Sale Yards site for all trades. A parkland atmosphere will be established and a section of the area to be given to Bendigo East Bowling Club.

Bendigo TAFE has links with all universities, other TAFE Colleges in Australia and more recently, negotiations are taking place with Indonesia (Made possible by Internet via the Australian Academic Research Network (AARNET) and is available to all students). Len Hall thanked Ron Smith and made the customary presentation.

BALLARAT TRIP - THE GREAT SOUTHERN WOOLSHED

At 8.10 a.m. our Bus Captian/Driver departed with a complement of 49 for our excursion to "The Great Southern Woolshed" at Ballarat billed a "A Fair Dinkum" Australian Attraction.

The early morning was a little "brisk" but a typical sunny day ensured (specially ordered by Arthur some weeks ago). We travelled via Maldon, Newstead, Smeaton and Creswick to our destination. The glorious sunny day highlighted the lushness of the ever changing countryside.

Fellowship flowed as Gordon shared some anecdotes of his recent

tour of America.

We arrived at approximately 10.10 a.m. and were greeted by Alan West (the general manager). He outlined the history along with the many facilities and demonstrations. The first of these being "The Ram Parade" scheduled to start at 10.45 a.m. which allowed time for a cuppa etc. "The Ram Parade" proved to be quite interesting with nine different breeds being presented. There were Camden Merino - Merino - Lincoln - Corridale - Romsey - Border Leicester - Southdown - Suffolk and Tukidale each paraded singly, unaided or directed to its appointed position on the display platform during which a comprehensive history of that animal and "its" uses was given. The reward to each animal was a small container of oats and lupins.

The expertise of a shearer was demonstrated as further history of the industry unfolded, in particular the handpieces, machines etc., the part played by unions piecing together the "how's and

why's" of the wool industry generally.

The animal nursery had penned exhibits together with a sheep

dog demonstration.

A number of "state of the art" electronic displays were available to any seeking further information in depth. Working displays of wool rug making, weaving, spinning, leather painting on hides, memorabillia was strategically placed throughout the building. A replica of a shearers hut with furnishings of the day was well displayed. The laser presentation of "Waltzing Matilda" proved to be rather popular.

Along Merino Walk some eight speciality Australian and Wool Shops had interesting, well presented "Australian Made" and local made wares for sale.

The food and allied facilities were of a high standard. Our lunch was enjoyed by all. The "Cook House" restaurant can cater for up to 400 serving typical Australian Fare.

The complex is situated on 12 acres of prime pastoral land adjacent to the Western Highway on the Melbourne side of Ballarat.

We departed from the complex around 2.15 p.m. making our way to a "roadside" Fruit and Vegie Market before proceeding across the city to the Botanical Gardens (the specially ordered weather still "hounding us" even in Ballarat). We travelled home via Daylesford acquired skill of "mental telepathy" which was "spot on" with many (could be a worry). One must not overlook the entertaining tale or two from Kath.
