In Bendigo region, there is expert assistance available, but also there are staff dotted about, for instance in Mildura and Gisborne to name only two. The service is available for everyone, not just pensioners.


A full range of services is available, but most people are unaware of it. So Susan and the organisation can put enquirers in touch with the appropriate body.

One such body will advise on arrangements for Medical Power of Attorney when needed. Enquiries are all kept anonymous. Other services are available for Health matters, for available Volunteer Programmes, for Crime Prevention and so on. There was an immediate and widespread series of questions as Susan finished her talk, to which she was able to give extensive answers.
