GIPPSLAND TOUR May 7 to 9, 2007

At 7.30am on Monday, May 9, we were on our way to Gippsland. From our club there were 18 members, wives and partners. In addition there were about the same number of members of Sandhurst Probus, some from Golden Square, the Ladies Probus and also our Friends of Probus.

With a stop at Bunyip for morning tea we kept going to Darnum and its Musical Village. There we had a marvellous time. The place is filled with antique keyboard instruments, pianos, pipe organs, harmonious, a harpsichord, a celeste, a zither and others. Our guide Peter, skillfully demonstrated these, named them for us and told us there history.

Following a basket lunch in the grounds, we had a very enjoyable music entertainment. Colin and his wife Sue joined Peter in a series of songs and pieces accompanied on the guitar, flute, oboe, mandolin and other instruments. We had over an hour of delightful music, from this talented trio.

We moved on eventually to Morwell for the stay of two nights at the Del Spana Motor Inn.

On Tuesday morning we were moving out early after breakfast, heading for the beautiful Tarra Bulga National Park. we were met by one of the Park Rangers who told us about the trees in this temperate rain forest, illustrating with a slide show which he had put together. Then some of us walked through to the suspension bridge which spans a tree fern gully. From the bridge you look down on a sea of canopies of fern trees.

We had lunch at the Port Albert Hotel which was first licensed in 1842 and has been open and operating longer than any other pub in Victoria. After lunch some members visited the Maritime Museum to delve into the history of the site which is one of Victoria's first European settlements.

West of Port Arthur is Toora where we visit the Wind Farm which takes advantage of the prevailing winds. Unfortunately the installation was not the part of Telstra which monitors the system. The engineer in charge was there and he gave us a good account of the system. The generator and its control system is housed in a nacelle which carries also the three bladed propeller which has 32 metre filter - glass blades, variable pitch, to catch the wind, this is at the top of a 67 metre tubular steel tower. The towers were manufactured in Bendigo by A.D.I.

The engineer informed us that it takes a 3 minutes for full power to be achieved. The twelve wind turbines at Toora have a capacity of 21 MW.

Leaving behind the Wind Farm we moved on to Yarrana where we had a brief stop but we were not able to visit the Old Court House, it had just closed. Contining, we drove past ch Loy Yang Power House and the open cut mine; then back to the Motor Inn.

After dinner we had an amusing night of fun and surprise. We all played ridiculous game with Val Murphy in charge, aided and hindered by Neville our Coach Captain. On Wednesday morning we left Morwell but on the way out we drove past, and around the Rose Gardens. These were planted by the local communing who also maintain them. There are 3000 rose bushes of 250 different varieties. It is a wonderful achievement and the local people are justifiably proud of it.

The next stop was at the Boolarra Fern Nursery where Rob and Marietta Herm, the proprietors, gave us a conducted tour together with advice about growing the many types of ferns.

Nearby is the Boolarra Fish Farm. Many different sorts of goldfish are bred here. They are exported to many different countries. On we proceeded to Thorpedale. This is a prolific potato growing area. Producing at peak season 150 truck loads a week. The surrounding scenery is open country providing beautiful scenic views. Here in particular is the home of the Murphy family. We stopped here to admire the gardens, to taste Val Murphy's specialty, potato ice-cream, and to buy potatoes.

Then we moved on the Moe and Silks Restaurant for a smorgasbord lunch. Then our last visit of the tour, to the Rosary, situated on 10 acres of gardens with lake. Antiques, crafts, plants and flowers are available for purchase.

We arrived home in the early evening after a great short holiday, thanks to Arthur and of course Val Murphy and Neville Dashurst.
