A MEMBER of a well-known Bendigo family served as an active member of the YMCA and Y's Mens' Club for forty years, filled most positions at the local club level including president, secretary and treasurer to move into the wider field of the International body and receive the movement's highest honour, 'The Harry M. Ballantyne Award of Merit.'

ARTHUR DAVID COWLING

this is his story.

Born in 1919, Arthur is the son of the late Algar Cowling, partner in the firm of W. Cowling which for many years sold Ford motor vehicles as well as operating a successful farm machinery and grain store business in Po

farm machinery and grain store business in Bendigo. Many will recall the latter sited at Market Square, now the Municipal Offices.

Educated at Quarry Hill and Bendigo High Schools, Arthur commenced his working life with his father as an assistant in the H.V. McKay depot for farm spare parts. 'Off-season' periods gave him the opportunity to meet the many poultry farmers in the district when he worked as a 'jockey' on truck deliveries of farm foods and grains.

He was studying Accountancy when World War 2 intervened and he joined the Infantry in the Army. Promotion followed and he became a Captain in the Australian Intelligence Corps specialising in the analysis of enemy Order of Battle.


The war over, he went back to his former job but eventually transferred to the Ford business selling tractors, farm machinery, trucks and passenger vehicles.

In 1969 the firm sold its properties and Arthur joined Provincial Motors who then held the Ford franchise. A year later he was appointed Manager, Truck and Tractor Division at Epsom.

It was immediately after the war when the YMCA took a strong option on his life - he became a member of the Y's Mens Club of Bendigo.

His interests in the YMCA and Y's Mens Club over the years has made him a driving force in both organisations. A YMCA Board member since 1950, he has served two terms as president and after 36 years he still remains a member of the Board.

At the International level the name Arthur Cowling is a familiar one. Regional Director for Australia and New Zealand, serving on the International Supplies Committee, Regional treasurer, Australia and New New Zealand for 22 years and member of the National Board reads like a (Continued overleaf)



full-time job; but, of course, all this work is voluntary.

Activities associated with the YMCA has taken Arthur many times overseas, organizing travel groups to Conventions located in many areas including Christchurch N.Z., Atami Japan, Stockholm, Singapore, Hawaii and Washington DC. At this latter convention in 1974, he was successful in his bid to have the 1978 Convention in Melbourne.

The Convention, at the Melbourne Hilton, with an attendance of 953 was a highlight of Arthur's career. Not only was he Chairman of the Host Convention Committee, but it was here that he was awarded the 'Harry M. Ballantyne Award of Merit' for service over many year.

At present he is a member of the International Council of Y's Men by virtue of his recent election as president, South Pacific Area of Y's Men International. In this capacity he has to attend meetings overseas at least twice in every year. He has just returned from a mid-year meeting in Geneva and on this trip he spent eleven days studying the Clubs in South India, visiting such places as Hyderabad, Madras, Cochin and Kottayam.

When Arthur says he has retired he paradoxically qualifies this by saying that he does not seem to have very much time for his hobbies of music, lapidary, gardening and woodwork. Little wonder - when he attends the YMCA several days in each week as Development Officer, undertaking fund-raising and membership-orientated activities!

Married to wife, Clarice, he has four children by his former wife, Norma, who died several years ago. Between them, Arthur and Clarice have fifteen grandchildren.

The young people of Bendigo owe Arthur Cowling much for his tireless efforts on their behalf; but, most importantly, he is a member of the Probus Club of Bendigo!

THE BIRTH OF A NAME: In an article in Probus News, the founder Probus, Harold Blanchard, tells how the name was derived.

"The members were asked for their suggestions for a name for the club. We got the usual rather fatuous suggestions (Ancient Lights, Has Beens, Old and Bold) but at last one of our more erudite members came up with the idea of PROBUS - PROfessional and BUSiness. He assured us that Probus was a latin word from which "probity" was derived and the name was adopted with enthusiasm. Incidently, we found there is a village in Cornwall called Probus and also there was a Roman Emperor of the same name who in his day was famous for the cultivation of the vine."

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
