GUEST SPEAKER Today we have the Chief Executive Officer of the City of Greater Bendigo, Peter Seamer.

At our April meeting we had as guest speaker Keith Falconer who was introduced by Kevin Houlahan. Keith entitled his talk "Eavesdropping" and he enthralled us with his account of his career in the Services. The "eavesdropping" is more formally called Wireless Serveillance. Because the Japanese code had been cracked it was possible for the High Command to place forces, ships, and planes at the right spot and time, enabling defeats to be inflicted at the Coral Sea, the Bismarck Sea and subsequent engagements.

After joining RAAF in April 1942, Keith trained at Ballarat and was then selected for special work (after careful checks on family background by security). A group of 20 was selected

for special training at Ascot Vale.

KANA, the Japanese morse code consists of the 26 normal letters and 50 extra. In service the Japanese transmissions were monitored, recorded and passed on to the code breakers. Transmissions from Japanese land bases, ships and aircraft were all observed and interpreted.

Keith was stationed first at Townsville, later at Port Moresby, then back to Townsville and on to Darwin.

As the Japanese were driven back, Keith was eventually moved on to Laete then San Miguel both in the Philippines, and it was there that he heard the news of the dropping of the atomic bomb and the end of the War.
