The guest speaker for today's meeting is Mrs. Greta Balsillie who will speak on "Bendigo Mothers of the Past". As a change to our normal format we welcome the partners of members who would be interested in attending our morning tea and talk.

For our April meeting three of our members were invited to speak to us about their experiences during the 1939 - 1945 war. These were Jack Watts - Army, Alex Reid - Navy (who stood in for Wal Spicer) and Ern Waterworth - Air Force.

Jack Watts was first cab off the rank and spoke of when he volunteered for service. His recollections commenced on Christmas Day, 1940 prior to issue of tropical uniform and embarkation to Malaya. This issue included the infamous Bombay Bloomers.

In November 1941 Jack, now with the 8th Battalion, was moved close to Singapore Island. In December 1941 the Japanese struck Singapore, sinking the British battleships

Prince of Wales and Repulse. Two months later Singapore fell and about 30,000 British and Australian troops, Jack included, were taken prisoner and marched out to Changi about 20 miles away. There was no water, electricity or sewerage in the camp and meal allowance was 1 lb of rice a day that reduced to 1/2 lb later. He spoke of the illnesses suffered by the P.O.W's. in the terrible conditions, the attempts by the cooks to make the rice palatable and the working parties sent into Singapore to clear the docks and streets. The Japanese changed the name of Singapore, altered the time to coincide with Tokyo time and changed the Gregorian calender from 1942 to their own calender of 2602.

In about May 1942 the first parties were sent into Burma to construct airfields and in early April 1943 the Japs sent 7000 P.O.W. troops to the Burma-Siam railway. Of the 7000 who went 2000 did not return. They were subjected to all manner of inhumane treatment.

The men saw nothing of the Red Cross parcels except for a few cigarettes.

Alex Read joined the Navy in 1942 and trained as a Naval Artificer on the maintenance and repair of Naval armament from the 8" turrets of the Australia down to rifles and pistols. He joined the Australia, the flagship of the Australian navy, and moved from the Borneo area to the Philippines taking part in landings along the way. Alex was involved in Operation Musketeer, the taking of the Philippines, with a massive convoy of 700 ships. His next area of operations was the invasion of Leyte Gulf when the Japanese kamikaze aircraft came on the scene. Not many troops were lost as a result of these attacks as the Japs concentrated on the heavily armed battleships; cruisers, destroyers and aircraft carriers. The Australia, a ship of about 17,000 tons, was built in Scotland around 1928 and was heavily armed with 8" guns which fired around 4 rounds a minute. An attacking aircraft had to run the gauntlet of 8" guns, 4" guns then 40 mm Pompoms before they could ram the ship. The first kamikaze aircraft hit the Australia at Leyte behind the bridge, killing the captain, wounding the Commodore and killing a number of personnel.

The Australia was hit by 5 successive suicide aircraft that resulted in many casualties and considerable damage to guns and the hull, particularly at the waterline. As a result she was sent to England for major repairs.

There were many acts of gallantry as a result of these actions.

Alex finished his talk with two amusing incidents relative to the "Heads".

The final talk was given by Ern Waterworth and related to his time in the RAAF. Ern's first efforts in aviation were the construction, flying and repair of model aircraft. When war was declared Ern tried to join the Air Force but was rejected because of the very high standards set. He was then called up by the army, trained as a signaller and denied a transfer to the Air Force as he was then considered to be indispensable due to his training. It took him another 11 months to be transferred to his preferred service.

His training then consisted of drill instruction at Shepparton, initial training school at Somers, flying school at Benalla where he was introduced to the Tiger Moth before being posted to Mallala in South Australia and the Avro Anson bomber.

Ern was then posted overseas, travelling across the Pacific in 5 star comfort on an American hospital ship, across America by troop train, billeted in New York and then by boat across the Atlantic to Liverpool. Once in England he was moved to hotel accommodation in Brighton where, at a dance, he met his future wife, Audrey.

By this stage the war in Europe was being won and the loss rate of aircrew was down from 12 1/2% to barely 1%. After further training at an Advanced Flying Unit in Scotland, where the main problem was trying to get enough dark-time for night flying exercises, Ern was drafted to a Central Flying School as an instructor. He then spent the rest of the war in England and Wales as an instructor.
