Pleasant Sunday Afternoon at Strathdale Community Centre on June 6th at 2.00 pm.




AUDITOR

GUEST SPEAKER

The m. cting in April was fortunate to hear a talk given by Brian Baker, who was introduced by Alan Dingle.

Brian recounted some of his experiences in P.N.G. where he worked in the management of the Paston Training College and the Missionary Aviation Fellowship. The natural conditions, high mountain ranges, deep valleys, cloud, mist and high humidity make aerial navigation a hair-raising occupation. Brian has some exciting tales to tell on this subject.

The Aviation Fellowship has 24 aircraft, 5 Twin Otters and 12 Cesna 206's included. The Fellowship is responsible for the only medical services in many places. It is international in its financing, among contributing countries are Finland, Canada, England and U.S.A. as well as Australia.

In recent times the Fellowship has provided valuable relief work in the period of disastrous drought and the tsunami of last year, in fact the first alarm in the case of the tsunami was raised by MAF pilots during a routine flight.

Since independence the lack of money has caused a reduction of work and funds for road making and maintenance, for education and for medical services. In the drought and the resulting famine there occurred a resurgence of the disease Yaws, which had been virtually eradicated; another disease on the upsurge is chicken-pox.

At the conclusion of the informative and very interesting talk Alan Court expressed the thanks and appreciation of the members and presented the usual Probus mug to Brian.


The objectives of this, the second such meeting were; fellowship, airing on views on Probus problems, interchange of ideas on tours, guest speakers and so on.



That's the little group of buildings on the right hand side of Piper Street as you drive South through Kyneton that you have never bothered to stop and look at. To mak sure we return we were given a tour (by coach) of the area and brought back to "Trio Station Winery" for a wine tasting and talk on the wine making process by manager Phillip Ford. It is good to see that the burnt out remains of the old market building have been transformed into a modern working winery.

After a further exploratory drive in the coach, we arrived at the picnic area of the Botanical Gardens for lunch arranged by our guides Betty and Don.

Later we were introduced to Members of the Kyneton Probus Club who had joined us for lunch. We also met Maisey Harper a long time source of inspiration for the Kyneton Tourist Authority. Then it was the turn of John Brown Knitting Mills to be overrun by Probians. We were told why some socks are better than others, shown the various yarns that are used, saw the fascinating machinery that performs its miracles and finally came to the shop. There we found that we could become the proud owners of socks, the like of which are usually sold in many overseas countries under expensive labels. At the factory shop they are very cheap. One can imagine the bundles of socks that came back to Bendigo!

Our final visit for the day was by no means an anti climax. Being more intimate establishments the group was divided. Part going to 'Meskill's Woollen Crafts' where we saw all manner of woollen goods and wool being spun into yarn before afternoon tea provided by Peter and Anne Sparle. Theother group went first to 'Kyneton Fine China' where Peter and Rita Daniels explained the intricacies of their Fine China production and decoration.
