TRAFALGAR DAY - October 21st. - what does it mean, and what is its significance for Australia. This was the essence of the address given by C.P.O. Donald Walker (Ret) at our October Meeting.

Most people are aware of the ultimate defeat of Napoleon by the Duke of Wellington at Waterloo. What is not generally recognised is that the French Army of the day was superior to the British and that the British victory would not have been achieved if the Royal Navy had not been better than the French Navy.

This superiority gave Nelson his victory at Trafalgar and ensured the ultimate defeat of Napoleon.

Nelson was revered not only for his prowess as a sailor but also for his respect for his sailors of all ranks, and his forward-

looking approach to recruitment - a man who had the foresight to see that "press-gang" methods were not the ideal recruitment method.

The relationship between Trafalgar Day and the development of Australia can only be appreciated if we recall that the early days of development of Australia coincided with the period of the Napoleonic Wars. The French, like the British were keen to colonize, and would almost certainly have invaded the Port Jackson area if they had not been defeated at Trafalgar.

Similarly - advice that the French were interested in the west coast endured that troops were despatched to Albany and the Swan River District of Western Australia and claimed all that part of New Holland that had not formally been claimed as New South Wales. The rest is History.

In concluding his remarks, C.P.O. Walker reminded us of the significance of the sea, and subsequently of sea-power.

We were reminded that almost all Australian trade is by sea, and that even today many international confrontations are resolved by sea-power. Examples quoted were the confrontation between U.S.A. and U.S.S.R. known as the "Cuban Crisis", the "Falklands War", and today, the "Gulf Crisis" where the U.N. embargo has to be enforced by sea-power.

As a final thought we were asked to be thankful that British seapower had ensured that Australia had no foreign frontier and thus Australians did not have to worry so much about overnight incursions as some others.

C.P.O. Walker was introduced by BILL THEODORE D.S.M. (Ex R.A.N.) and thanked by HARRY HIGGINBOTHAM who made the usual presentation.

BARRETT'S SAFARI TOURS seem to have claimed yet another group of Probians on a 37 day trip to Cape York.

The overland trip to Cairns - previously described - was followed by a boat trip in the "Noel Buxton". The trip to the tip of Australia included stops at a number of islands where snorkelling and swimming were popular.

Fishing was also popular and sufficient were caught to feed all aboard.

The final island stop was Thursday Island in Torres Strait. Thursday Island has a population of approximately 2,700 - mostly aborigines and Torres Strait Islanders. Health care is basically in the hands of different church groups that are represented.

Fresh water is extremely scarce on the Island, but the bowlers are not to be beaten. The 'green' is black. It consists of a fine mesh surface impregnated with bitumen, a great surface to reflect the tropical heat.

On the return journey passengers were transferred from the boat to the tip of Cape York - an almost unique experience.

Colin married in 1947 and he and May have a daughter at Mandurang, a son at Sorrento and 6 grand-children.
