GUEST SPEAKER at the September Meeting will be Rev. Lindsay Faulkner of the Uniting Church. Lindsay will address the meeting on aspects of his recent trip to Korea.

NEW MEMBERS inducted at the August meeting were Alex Wilson and Bruce Perrin. Alex and Bruce were introduced to members by Ken Coles and Allan Dingle respectively. After being presented with their membership pins both were formally welcomed by our esteemed president ea Brock.

WASTE is a personal matter. It seems it may be more so when you are literally "up to your elbows in it". My authority for these observations was our guest speaker at the August meeting - NEIL BURNS.

Neil, who is the Chief Administrator of the Bendigo Water Board is a former student of the Civil Engineering course previously conducted by the Bendigo College of Advanced Education. He has worked as a Civil Engineer in Shepparton as well as here in Bendigo.

Before commencing the formal part of his address Neil referred to his

perception for the need to extend the current two-year start to Engineering courses at B.C.A.E. to at least three years.

As Chief Administrator of the Water Board. Neil is responsible for the collection, treatment and disposal of approximately five million gallons (20 megalitres) of sewage per day.

While 99.5% of this sewage is water, the remainder yields 10 tonnes of solids.

Approximately 85% of the waste in the system is from household sources and the remainder is either trade waste or hazardous waste. (Bendigo has little of the latter).

Trade waste sources include the Saleyards, Sandhurst Foods, tanning

industries and food outlets - particularly the "fast-food" group. Currently collection of sewage is by way of between 600 and 700 kms

of mains. Treatment is undertaken at Epsom/Huntly where the Board has 1000 acres under irrigation, and supplies irrigation water to farmers downstream by way of the Bendigo Creek.

Current plans to upgrade the treatment works involve expenditure \$22.5 million. The resultant new plant is designed to cope with Bendigo's needs for the next 30 years and will ensure that the water discharged from the plant will be free of the nutriments now upsetting the balance in the Bendigo Creek.

Requests for information concerning the possible collection of lost property from the system include enquiries for rings, wallets, money

and false teeth!!!!

As well as addressing the guestion of sewage. Neil spent some time on general environmental issues that led to discussion of the over-use of water and the recycling of materials such as paper, glass, plastic.

In response to a question members were advised that water discharged from the new treatment plant would be sufficiently pure to drink if it were not for the fact there was no way of knowing what viruses had entered the system. Viruses are currently almost impossible to eliminate.

Neil was introduced by CLIFF BINKS and thanked by TRAVIS WILSON.
