Our guest speaker today will be M/s. Mandy Smith, Operations Manager of the Bendigo Prison, who will speak on Prison Management.

The speakers at the August meeting were, although not as described in August Probe, nevertheless provided the Club with an interesting and informative talk.

During the morning session members were delighted to hear Bruce Michelsen's account of his "Olympic Run" in 2000 with comparison to the more difficult 1956 event.

As runners were able to purchase their torch in 2000 Bruce was able to demonstrate the structure of the standard model. This was later passed around so that all members present were able to say that they had a personal experience with the "2000" version of the Olympic Torch.



After morning tea members were advised that the scheduled speaker, Mr. D. La Ponder was unable to attend.

At the President's request Ray Downey introduced three members of Vic Roads staff, Mr. L. Clay. Ms. C. Driscoll and Ms. J Leunig.

After the introductions Ms. Driscoll described the content and method of a four week discussion course designed to help make elderly drivers more aware of the problems that may make them more susceptible to accidents. Included were:-

- (a) side effects of medication always ask your doctor
- (b) gradual deterioration of eyesight
- (c) gradual deterioration of hearing
- (d) the onset of stiffness of the joints that determine the ability to observe objects all round a vehicle
- (e) Slower reflexes

Each of these possible conditions should be considered in relation to specific driving conditions such as density of traffic, condition of road surface, time of day and climatic conditions.

During the discussion period that followed comments were made concerning -

- (a) the growth of the elderly group
- (b) the vulnerability of various age groups
- (c) training programs for the pre-driver
- (d) perceived characteristics of groups as :-
 - (1) P plates
 - (2) young ladies in new, small cars
 - (3) gentlemen wearing hats


On a more serious note it was pointed out that we all had a responsibility to advise Vic Roads, or Police, if we knew of a driver who was incapable of driving safely.

VISIT TO EMPIRE RUBBER

Two conducted tours of Empire Rubber were arranged for Thursday and Friday, the 20th & 21st of July. I like Arthur Morris and probably others in the party had a special interest in seeing how some of the automotive products were made as 95% of the work carried out is for the auto industry. Rubber parts are produced for GMH, Ford, Toyota and Mitsubishi and also for other companies who then supply parts themselves to those companies. A very small section of the plant is set up for the production of parts for export, namely Toyota in Fiji.

Sid Spoffath was our guide after we split up into two groups whilst the others were shown around by Owen Lockwood.

Sid explained to us that Empire Rubber has been on the present site since 1973 and were so successful that, at a later stage, they were taken over by BTR. There are now over 500 employees and the assembly line works non stop 24 hours a day with three shifts. They have only 17 maintenance staff and many innovations have been adopted in an effort to avoid holdups along the line. Originally, there were only two bays working but that has increased to the present five.

The raw rubber comes in an EPS Compound and has to be mixed to the various textures required for the production of various parts. Synthetic rubber is also used in the operations.

The factory employs two different sections in their operations-

1. Anti-vibration (Shockers etc) &

2. Extrusions (Motor vehicle door & window seals)

Most of the anti-vibration section deals with the bonding of rubber onto steel such as engine mountings. The steel has to be perfectly clean and a special paint has to be applied to the portion to which the rubber is to be attached. Any loose rubber still adhering to the finished product is removed either physically on large parts or in an ice rumbler for smaller parts. The ice rumbler makes the loose rubber brittle and it just breaks off in the rumbler. The final part is given a phosphate coating to prevent rust.

The extrusion section has four systems the first being a salt bath, the other three systems are - Cold Feed Autoclave, Injection Blaster 250 degrees and Microwave.

The main product being manufactured at the time was the Ford AU door seals which proved very interesting. As the seal has to have a steel support and the rubber for the sealing section has to be softer than the rubber for the exterior, it means that the three separate items are extruded through a die to create a long, continuous length. This has then to be cut to the right lengths, plastic clips

attached and the ends joined together to complete the operation. The scal is extruded at a rate of 12 to 18 metres a minute, and the cross section of the scal is checked on a regular basis under a 10 to 1 magnifier.

Interestingly, the plastic clips attached to the seal are colour coded, Red for RH front, Yellow for LH front, Green for RH rear and Orange for LH rear. Blue and White are used on long wheel based vehicles such as station wagons, etc.

Competition is strong and pricing is very difficult, as the longer a model is in production the lower the price obtainable in what is called a "cost down" pricing system. The main competition comes from Bridgestone in Australia and Toyota in Japan.

We all emerged from the factory into a bitterly cold wind much the wiser for the visit.


