# **GUEST SPEAKER:**

At the last meeting we had two speakers, Muriel and Peter Thornton who were introduced who were introduced by Alan Dingle. Peter began by claiming that he had little skill as a photographer, but as the pictures showed, he was being unduly critical of his skill. The photographs were taken during a 2,500 km trip from Shanghai to Chonqing on the mighty Yangtze Kiang, the third longest river, after the Nile and the Amazon, in the world, with a side trip to Xian by plane.



Peter was succeeded by Muriel who explained the material shown. China is a very big and beautiful country, the scenes of misty mountains and placid waters shown on traditional chinese painting truly represent the scenes.

Shanghai, a huge city, really impressed the Thorntons. The CBD has impressive modern buildings, but the historic architecture and traditional way of life still can be seen.

The cruise ship was big, carrying 140 passengers, with a crew of 112. The river is a major routeway through the coastal low lands. Flooding is a serious problem in the river valley, to control this and to help irrigation and supply power, a huge dam is under construction where the river emerges from the gorges. Upstream of the dam 1.5 million people will be

displaced, the cultivated riverside terraces will be inundated under 135m of water by 2003 rising to 175m by 2009. Besides the main gorge of the Yangtze there are minor gorges passing through beautiful mountainous country. To view them the passengers boarded sampans which were poled up the tributary.

The current up the Yangtze gorge is very strong and navigation demands skill and care. Here the pilot instructed the helmsman by means of hand signals.

Much of the working in rural china is carried out with human labour, Muriel and Peter were astonished to see big, precast concrete electricity pylons being manhandled up the steep hills.

Chonging, where the cruise ended, is one of the major industrial areas of

China, and a result of this is that the city is subject to smog. The Thorntons were not very impressed.

Again they were not impressed by the city of Xian, nor by the army of terracotta warriors displayed there. They saw two historic buildings there, the Wild White Goose temple and the Drum Tower.

Some dates about the Yangtze dam. The site was chosen in 1930, but because of invasions and wars and revolutions, work was only begun in 1994. It is scheduled for completion in 2009.

The speakers were thanked by Cliff Nievandt, who made the usual presentation.
