In the absence of our president and vice president, immediate past president Alec introduced Mr Peter Thompson who is the Chief Librarian at Latrobe Uni. Peter gave a very informative talk on mechanics institutes. The mechanics institutes started during the 19th Century in Northern England and Scotland. The earliest in Australia was in Hobart in 1827 and the earliest Melbourne Mechanics Institutes was in the Athenaeum in 1839 and is still operating today. During the gold rush in 1950 onwards Mechanics Institute exploded in numbers. Bendigo had 9, with Sandhurst being the largest and was started in 1854. After WWII public libraries were established which closed most of the few remaining Mechanics Institutes Libraries by 1950 there were very few left. After answering questions from members Nigel Christie made the usual presentation.

By the 2nd of December, so many people had arrived that a notice appeared in the Government Gazette that "from this day, the place for holding of petty sessions at the junction of Bendigo Creek to Golden Gully, Mount Alexander (Loddon District) shall be called Castleton"

Six weeks later, on the 18th of January 1853 it was renamed Sandhurst after the English military academy. (Sandhurst means a place which is mostly wooded in sandy ground)

As a result of a poll in May 1891, the City of Sandhurst was renamed Bendigo. (the first time that Bendigo had officially borne that name).

Our first visit will be to: the RAAC Memorial and Army Tank Museum at Puckapunyal Commemorating the Royal Australian Armoured Corps and the Australian Light Horse. There is an extensive array of army vehicles, equipment and memorabilia.

Next: We travel on to Seymour where we will visit the Seymour Railway Heritage Centre: It is located adjacent to the former V.R. Seymour Locomotive Depot, there is large undercover area for storage and restoration works.

Upon our arrival we will have a two course lunch provided by the staff of the Centre, and dependent upon conditions, this may be served as we wish either under shade canopies or in the heritage Avoca-Dining Car of yesteryear.

The Centre is heavily involved in the restoration and ongoing maintenance of the railway vehicles in its collection and making access to these vehicles to the visitor and tourist. In short, it is dedicated to preserving Victorian Railway Rolling Stock in operating condition.

The Centre has been entrusted with a large array of early & more recent Rolling Stock Vehicles, indeed a small group of three carriages built in 1890 (which featured in the Ned Kelly Film siege at Glenrowan), also the Sydney Limited and Spirit of Progress Parlour Cars and the Avoca Dining car, added to this many varying classes of Diesel Electric Main Line Locomotives ranging from 600 to 3000 Horse Power

- ** There will be a number guides, among whom will be a number of former railwaymen.
- ** You will be given conducted tours through many of these vehicles ** (Adequate seating available.)
- ** Time permitting, we may have the opportunity to see other items of interest in the Seymour area.

This will prove to be a very interesting and enjoyable day, which should prove to be of interest to all, a trip down memory lane. Be in it, come along and experience the friendship of Probus.
